SUBJECT: Student Travel – Overnight Trip to Cal-Wood

Policy Wording: All overnight trips and trips exceeding 200 miles round trip have prior approval of the Board of Education.

Policy Interpretation: This policy is interpreted to include submitting to the Board all student travel requests which include overnight stays and/or are in excess of 200 miles round trip.

Decision Requested: District administration is seeking Board approval for overnight travel of 37 6th-grade students from Trailside Academy and 4 staff chaperones for the dates of November 30 – December 2, 2022.

Report: This trip aims to engage students in environmental and science education during an immersive 3-day, 2-night experience customized to meet the academic and social needs of Trailside students. Cal-Wood's expert staff will lead students through hands-on exploration of fire ecology, snow science, weather, forestry, geology, and pond ecosystems.

The mission of Cal-Wood is, "To inspire a greater appreciation for the natural world; to offer environmental education to those who would not otherwise experience it, and to provide unique educational opportunities in a special mountain setting."

<u>Transportation and Contingency Planning:</u> Mapleton transportation will be utilized to transport students to and from Cal-Wood.

<u>Emergency Consideration</u>: A staff chaperone will be trained and delegated to provide medications. Staff chaperones will also have access to a telephone to call in case of an emergency. A staff member will drive their vehicle separately to have access to transportation in the event of an emergency.

<u>Cost and Source of Funding:</u> The total cost for this trip is \$6,000 covered by the school's activities account.

Policy Wording: The Superintendent shall provide necessary reports to the Board as directed.

Policy Interpretation: This policy is interpreted to include updates to the Board on student enrollment for each academic year.

Decision Requested: District administration is providing this report for information only. No decision is requested this evening.

Report: Each fall, Colorado school districts conduct official student enrollment counts during a window of time centered around October 1st. This annual October Count is used by the State and the District for planning, reporting, and funding purposes. Mapleton's report for the 2022-2023 school year will be filed with the Colorado Department of Education on or before November 23rd, 2022.

The official count date for this year was Monday, October 3rd, 2022. Students in grades K-12 who were enrolled and attending on October 3rd or those who attended both the 3rd and resumed attendance within 30 days after October 3rd are counted in our October Count submission. Preschool student count allows us to use either the October 3rd or November first count date. We opted to use the November 1st count date this year as we had more students enrolled on November 1st than we did on October 3rd.

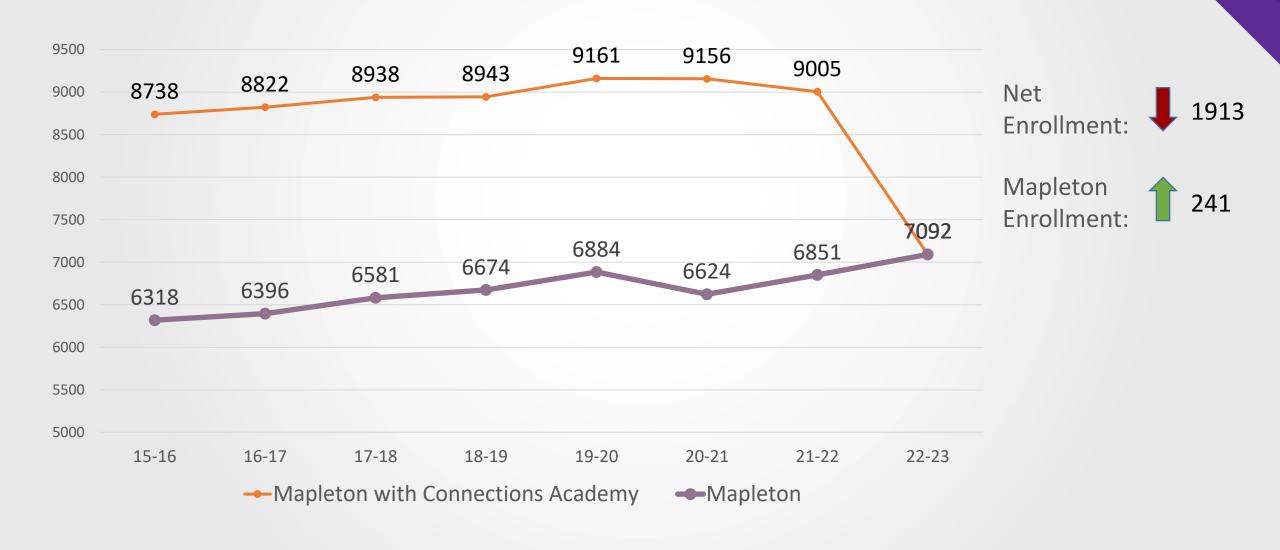
District Enrollment Update Preliminary Data

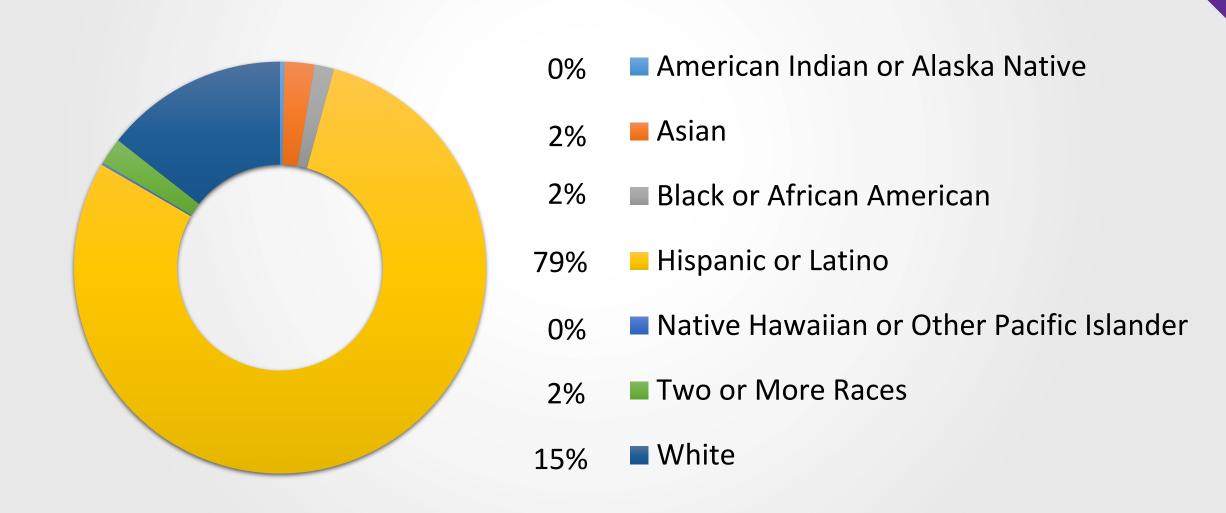

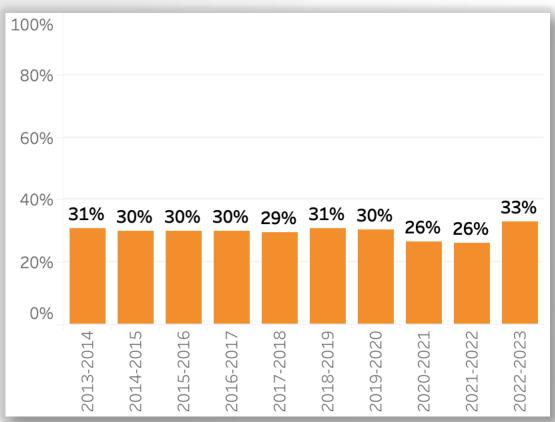

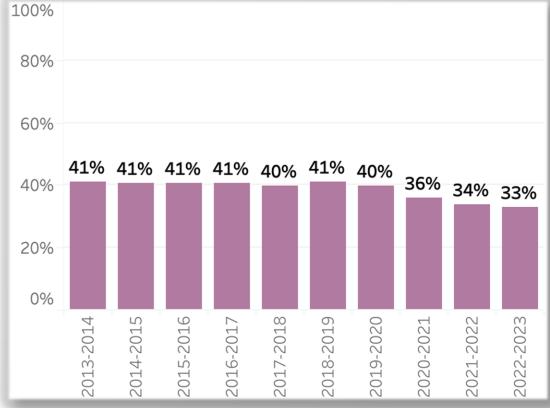

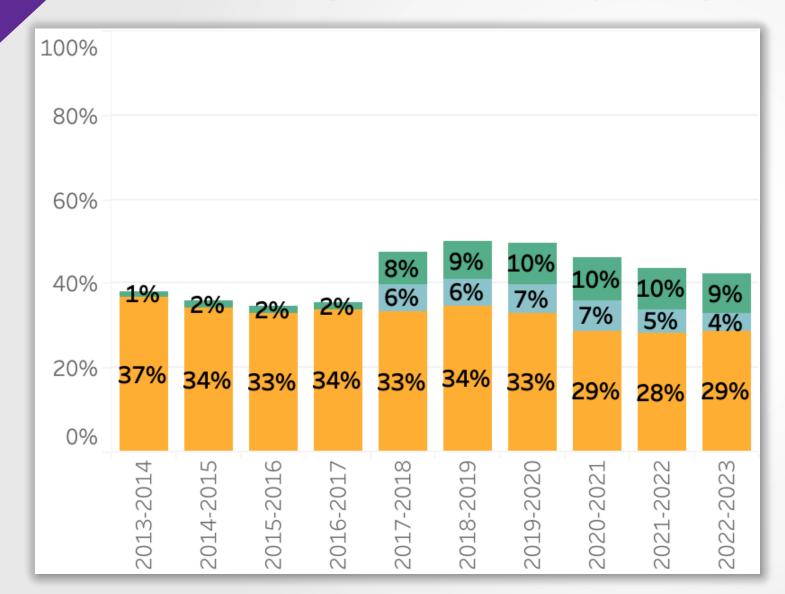

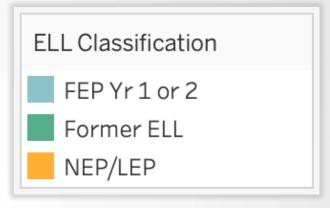

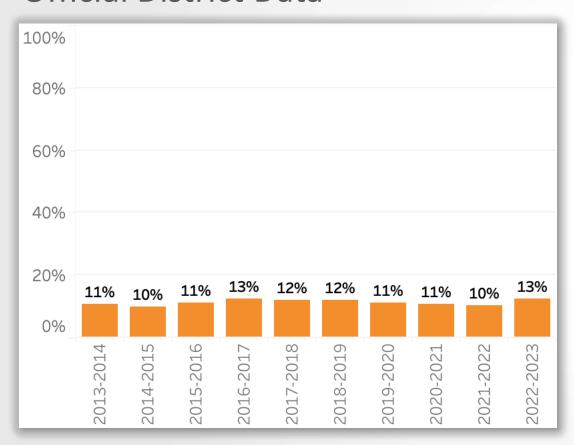

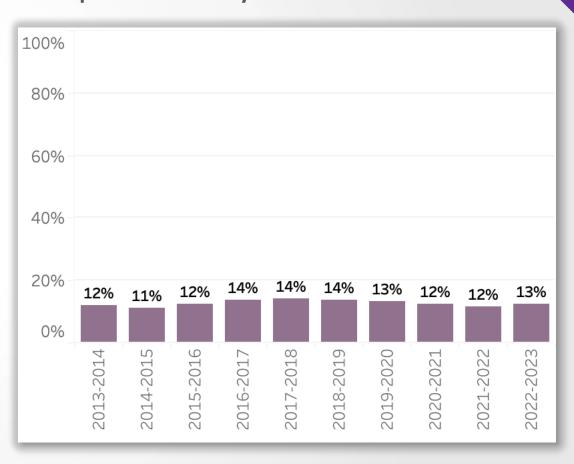

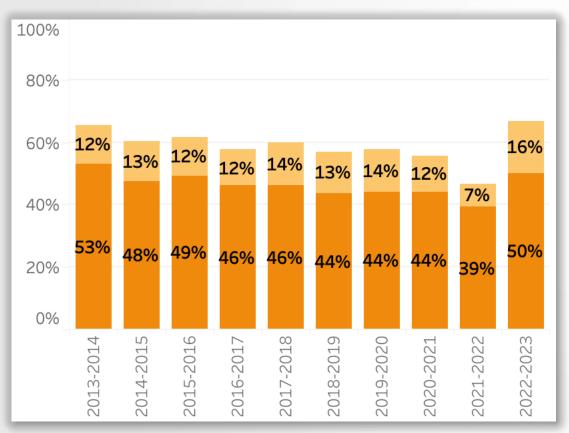

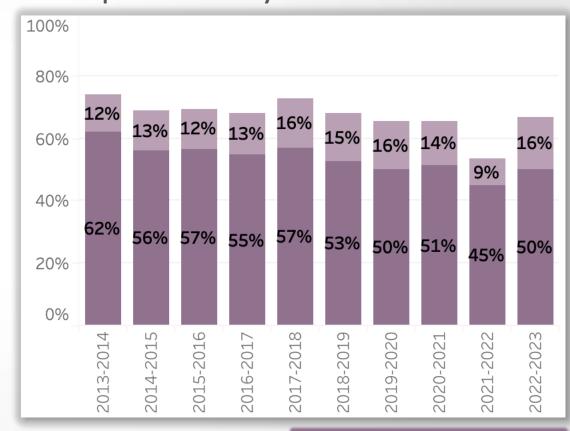
Free/Reduced Meal Status

Policy Interpretation: This policy is interpreted as requiring periodic reports to the Board regarding major improvement initiatives.

Decision Requested: District administration is providing this report for information purposes only. No decision is requested.

Report:

In the Spring of 2020, Mapleton embarked on "Project LIFT" to dramatically increase student achievement. We established a relationship with the University of Virginia; their Partnership for Leaders in Education program had a proven record of results in school districts around the United States.

Our executive team took on the role of "Core Change Team" in the UVA schema. We ensure that all improvement efforts are aligned with the District mission and the change initiative purpose statement. The purpose statement was updated for the current school year, with input from school directors in the second and third cohorts of Project LIFT, as follows:

The mission of Mapleton Public Schools is to guarantee all students can achieve their dreams. This requires us to ensure that each student graduates and is prepared for high levels of success in his or her chosen post-secondary endeavor. To that end, we will elevate our practices in the areas of leadership, support and accountability, talent management, and instructional infrastructure. Through positive and productive relationships with students, improved alignment of systems, and increased rigor, we will dramatically improve student experiences and achievement.

Within our unique Mapleton context, we will:

- synchronize all resources to systematically advance student learning,
- build a system to attract/recruit, hire, retain, and support effective staff;
- focus, simplify, and commit to effective improvement strategies;
- develop a culture of shared leadership, shared responsibility, and collective efficacy; and
- create clarity by communicating high expectations for all.

Five of our small high schools, along with their school supervisors and the executive team formed the first cohort of Mapleton participants, attending "boot camp" in the summer of 2020. Six of our schools serving middle-level students and their school supervisors formed the second cohort and began their training in the summer of 2021. The nine remaining Mapleton schools started their LIFT experience in the summer of 2022. As a system, we are now in our third year of partnership with UVA. Through multiple assessments, training, tools, and other learning experiences, UVA has helped us to establish District conditions conducive to supporting schools in realizing marked improvement in student learning outcomes.

Twice each year, UVA consultants visit the district (either virtually or in person) and provide us with critical feedback. What follows is a short summary of the October 2022 site visit, organized by four key priority "levers"—leadership, support and accountability, talent management, and instructional infrastructure.

<u>System Leadership - Strengths</u>

- District-wide commitment to clear and prioritized work
- Shifting culture of accountable talk and action
- Greater collective accountability for problems of practice

System Leadership - Opportunities

- District-level short-term actions to ensure positive results
- Development of a sustainability leadership plan

<u>Talent Management - Strengths</u>

- Focus on high-quality teachers and leaders
- Focus on the development and retention of teachers
- Despite the challenges of the teacher shortage, the Talent Management Department remains solution-oriented

<u>Talent Management - Opportunities</u>

- Focus on a pipeline for future school directors
- Shifts in the labor market will require continued bold and innovative moves
- Development of a strategy for vacancies and absences to ensure effective teachers in the most critical areas

Instructional Infrastructure - Strenaths

- Systems for monitoring student achievement
- Increasing capacity for leading instruction
- Focus on early literacy

Instructional Infrastructure - Opportunities

- Develop a common definition, look-fors, and exemplars for rigorous instruction
- Create a common classroom observation tool
- Seek evidence of alignment between implementation and effectiveness data

<u>Support and Accountability - Strengths</u>

- Supervision to grow leadership practices

The commitment of the Board of Education to this work, along with the commitments of District and school leaders, and Mapleton teachers has not wavered. Project LIFT continues to change and improve routines, practices, and approaches across the District. First-quarter interim assessments indicate that student learning is improving, as well.

Reorganization Committee

Policy Wording: In accordance with State law, the Board shall appoint a School District Accountability Committee. The District Accountability Advisory Committee (DAAC) shall have those powers and duties prescribed by State law. The Board and the DAAC shall, at least annually, cooperatively determine the areas of study, in addition to budget preparation, that the DAAC shall provide input and on which it may make recommendations to the Board.

Policy Interpretation: This policy is interpreted to include monthly updates to the Board regarding the proceeding of DAAC meetings.

Decision Requested: District administration is providing this report for information only. No decision is requested this evening.

Report: The Colorado Department of Education sent a letter to the Mapleton DAAC on October 17th requesting the DAAC appoint an individual to serve on the Adams 14 reorganization committee.

On November 14th, the DAAC held a meeting to appoint Frankie Salazar to the Adams 14 reorganization committee. Frankie Salazar meets all requirements to serve on this committee.

The appointment of an individual to serve on the Adams 14 reorganization committee was the only topic on the agenda for this special DAAC meeting.

The next DAAC meeting will be held on Tuesday, November 29, 2022, from 4:30 to 6:00 P.M. as an online meeting using the Microsoft Teams platform. Additional meeting dates will be added if and when DAAC participants request additional time to understand and comment on specific topics.

SUBJECT: Adams 14 Reorganization Committee Appointment

Policy Wording: The Board of Education for Mapleton Public Schools encourages the participation of citizens of the district in decision-making processes.

Decision Requested: District administration requests Board approval to appoint three members to the Adams 14 Reorganization Committee.

Report: On May 24, 2022, the State Board of Education ordered the Adams 14 School District to begin the process of exploring reorganization per C.R.S. 22-30-106. In that Order, the State Board of Education designated the reorganization committee to involve Adams 14 School District, Mapleton Public Schools, Adams 12 Five Star Schools, and Brighton School District 27J. Per C.R.S. 22-30-106(2) each affected school district must appoint a total of three committee members per the following guidelines:

Two members appointed by the Board of Education.

One member appointed by the school district accountability committee.

The recommendation from the Board of Education is to appoint Charlotte Ciancio and Michelle Ramos members of the Adams 14 Reorganization Committee.

The recommendation from the school district accountability committee is to appoint Frankie Salazar, a parent of a child attending a public school in the affected area, as a member of the Adams 14 Reorganization Committee.

The Board of Education also recommends Mallory Boyce, a parent of a child in the Mapleton Public Schools District, as an alternate member of the Adams 14 Reorganization Committee if one of the members can not attend or is no longer able to fulfill their duties on the committee.

The committee must be appointed and hold its first meeting prior to November 17, 2022.
